Ernesto Fernández Polcuch is a specialist in Science, Technology and Innovation Policy, with a M.Sc. in Science, Technology and Society from the National University of Quilmes, Argentina.

He currently serves as Senior Programme Specialist, Science and Technology Policy and Capacity Building, at the UNESCO Regional Office for Science in Latin America and the Caribbean, based in Montevideo.

He has previously worked as Programme Specialist at the UNESCO Windhoek Office, managing UNESCO's programmes in fields such as Science and Technology Policy, Basic Sciences and Engineering, Freshwater, Environment, and Geology, for five Southern African countries.

From 2002 to 2008, he led the Science and Technology Statistics team at the UNESCO Institute for Statistics, Montréal, being responsible for producing world-wide S&T statistics, developing methodologies for S&T&I data collection in developing countries, and producing various analytical reports on issues such as Women in Science.

Before joining UNESCO he had worked with RICYT, the Ibero American Network on Science and Technology Indicators, since its establishment in 1995, as Technical Secretary and later R&D co-ordinator, setting up the S&T indicators system in Latin America.

His other experience includes working as a researcher and as professor at the National University of Quilmes and other universities in Argentina and Latin America, adviser to the National Secretary for Science, Technology and Innovation in Argentina, and as a consultant to various National and International agencies, including UNESCO, the Organization of American States (OAS), the World Bank, and OECD.

He has published numerous papers related to Science, Technology and Innovation statistics and policy, and Higher Education policy in national and international peer reviewed journals, book chapters, and research reports. He has also presented several papers at international conferences and congresses, and has conducted training seminars and workshops in Latin America, Africa, Asia and transition countries in Europe.
